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COURSE PROGRAMME

LEVEL A1

(STANDARD)

The A1 course has a minimum duration of 60 hours of teaching and learning. It consists of 13 didactic units, which are organised according to linguistic objectives and everyday topics. In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic content, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

The students, on completion of their A1 course, are expected to:

- Have linguistic and non-linguistic resources which enable them to introduce themselves, to express nationality, age or profession, to use basic greetings and farewell expressions, to express interest in the state of their interlocutor and react to news.
- Be able to carry out basic transactions in shops, post offices, banks, clinics and transport. Be able to carry out very simple, predictable and routine tasks, such as purchasing basic consumer goods and solving simple problems.
- Be able to ask for directions in order to reach a place or ask for schedules.
- Participate in conversations in a simple way and make themselves understood, even if they are not precise about the timing of events and make frequent mistakes.
- Be able to understand very simple, short, clearly structured written texts on posters, signs, and catalogues. The students will be able to write short, simple postcards, e.g., to send greetings and also to fill in forms with simple personal data such as name, nationality, and address.
- Understand names and short, simple utterances in conversations in which interlocutors are willing to cooperate.
- Learn about basic aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

- Verbs in the present tense (regular and irregular).
- Expressing status, possession, and relationship.
- Talk about the neighbourhoods and the types of houses.
- Talking on the phone.
- Asking for products and their prices. Indicating quantity.
- Describing usual actions. Express the frequency of actions.
- Express tastes, preferences, interests, and opinions.
- Talk about leisure and free time activities.
- Ask about health. Make an appointment with a doctor.
- Expressing physical sensations.
- Expressing obligation and necessity.
- Make recommendations.
- Describing an action that is being carried out.
- Talking about future actions. Expressing plans and projects.
- Discussing personal and kinship relationships.
- Buying in shops: asking for products, asking for prices, etc.
- Talking about past expressions related to the present.
- Asking and answering, affirmatively or negatively, whether an action has been completed.
- Asking and answering if anything has ever been done.
- Expressing agreement or disagreement.

- Mid-term: one (1) achievement test is taken after completing the first two levels of the course. The student's work, participation and progress in class will also be assessed qualitatively.
- Final: a proficiency test is carried out to certify the level, once the course is completed. The result of this test can be Pass or Fail (*Apto / No apto*). In case a student has registered in a course that lasts less than the hours stipulated for completing the whole AI course, the results of the achievement tests and the teacher's assessment will be taken into account for the issuing of the certificate.

COURSE PROGRAMME

LEVEL A2

(STANDARD)

The A2 course has a minimum duration of 120 hours of teaching and learning. It consists of 11 didactic units, which are organised according to linguistic objectives and everyday topics. In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic content, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

During the A2 course, the students will learn and practise the basic notions for:

- Understand sentences and expressions related to fields of immediate priority (e.g., basic personal and family information, shopping, place of residence, employment) in order to deal with concrete needs, provided that the speech is clearly and slowly articulated.
- Talk about themselves, other people, living or working conditions, daily activities and tastes, in a short list of simple phrases and sentences.
- Take part in easy and regular interaction, asking and answering questions on familiar topics in predictable everyday situations, even if with assistance.
- Talk about past events or experiences.
- Understand short, simple texts, audios or videos on everyday matters containing familiar vocabulary related to their reality, including a large part of internationally used terms.
- Write short, simple texts on topics related to areas of immediate need.
- Communicate the main ideas and relevant information from conversations and texts dealing with familiar topics, that are appropriate for their level, well-structured and in everyday language.
- Use simple words to ask someone to explain something.
- Realize when there are obvious difficulties and indicate the nature of the problem.
- Learn about basic aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic content, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

At the end of the B1 course, the students are expected to:

- Spontaneously engage in conversations on everyday topics or that are relevant to daily life (e.g., family, hobbies, work, travel and current affairs).
- Describe unpredictable situations, explain the main points of an idea or a problem, express feelings or thoughts on abstract or cultural topics with reasonable accuracy, orally or in writing.
- Relate past and present actions: compare, evaluate and corroborate them.
- Talk about future and conditional actions.
- Give advice and make recommendations. Make judgements and evaluations. Express, explain and argue an opinion.
- Understand texts that are written in every day or work-related language. Understand the description of events, feelings, and wishes in personal letters.
- Write simple, coherent texts on topics that are familiar or relevant to them.
- Learn about many aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic content, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

On completion of the B2 course, the students are expected to:

- Participate appropriately in different types of social situations and act according to the social conventions of the community (meals, accepting and declining invitations, etc.).
- Use a wide linguistic repertoire, sufficient to express themselves with arguments and nuances, without making big wording mistakes and with a clear pronunciation.
- Have sufficient linguistic ability to lay out the details of a problem, be able to submit a complaint and resolve conflict situations, arguing and using a persuasive language.
- Exchange opinions and point of views, sharing personal experiences, feelings and wishes on topics of personal or general interest.
- Be able to deal with any kind of text, dealing with both concrete and abstract issues, including technical discussions related to the students' specific field of knowledge.
- Understand literary works, films and plays, provided the standard register is used.
- Find relevant details in complex, long texts and quickly identify the content and importance of the information.
- Learn about many aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

- Expressing opinions and tastes, making assumptions and speculations and summarising contents.
- Expressing probability and making hypotheses in the future.

LEVEL C1

(STANDARD)

The C1 course has a minimum duration of 180 hours of teaching and learning. It consists of 22 teaching units, which are organized according to linguistic objectives and everyday topics. In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic content, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

The students, on completion of the C1 course, are expected to:

- Communicate fluently and spontaneously, with little hesitation, even in difficult situations.
- Use the appropriate register for each type of situation, and use different registers (causal, neutral, formal, or high formal) in a coherent and consistent way.
- Carry out transactions that are sensitive or have a certain degree of complexity, such as making arrangements by phone, carrying out complex bank transaction, fixing breakdowns by following telephone instructions.
- Learn a wide range of idiomatic and colloquial expressions, and notice changes of register.
- Follow a long discourse, even when it is not clearly structured and when relationships are not explicitly stated.
- Easily follow long and complex conversations between third parties, as well as long discussions, lectures, and presentations.
- Convey content for others with great accuracy, through notes, paraphrases, and summaries.
- Learn about many aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

GENERAL CONTENTS

The students, during the C1 course, will learn and practise the basic notions of how to use the language for:

- Introducing themselves and talking about their tastes and interests.
- Talking about the different times in a person's life and career.
- Talking about present, past and future events or experiences.
- Talking about probability. Making hypotheses in the past and projections.
- Expressing regret and complaining.
- Talking about hypotheses that are prior to a past event.
- Talking about conditions. Use conditional clauses and connectors.
- Reflecting on what art is and the possible reinterpretations of an artistic work.
- Talking about consumer habits and other social aspects of everyday life.
- Analysing real texts, videos, or audio (in physical or digital format) that deal with controversial topics or topics of general interest.
- Debating on controversial issues or situations of general interest.
- Expressing an opinion. Expressing total or partial agreement and disagreement.
- Discussing advantages and disadvantages of something, arguing and justifying.
- Negotiating and learning persuasion strategies.
- Identifying the characteristics of an emotive speech.
- Talking about stereotypes, habits, traditions and opening time of a place.
- Expressing attitudes and intellectual states; persuading, influencing, manipulating and clarifying.
- Identifying and using irony as a method of persuasion and social criticism.
- Describing physical, character, and personality traits.

- Mastering word-formation mechanisms to learn vocabulary.
- Improving the quality of text writing in journalistic genre.
- Using colloquial words, sayings and proverbs, institutionalized utterances and idioms, typical of Spanish-speaking culture, especially Spain.
- Knowing the main lexical collocations of different terms.
- Using discourse connectors.
- Practising the use of the impersonal “se”. Reported speech.
- Making comparisons.

EVALUATION

The school implements different evaluation instruments to assess students' academic progress. Enrolled students will be assessed in three phases:

- Beginning: a level test is taken before the start of the course.
- Mid-term: one (2) achievement tests are taken. The first, after completing the first three levels of the course. The second, after studying 60% of the course. The student's work, participation, and development in class will also be assessed qualitatively.
- Final: a proficiency test is carried out to certify the level, once the course is completed. The result of this test may be Pass or Fail (*Apto/No apto*). In case a student has registered in a course that lasts less than the hours stipulated for completing the whole C1 course, the results of the achievement tests and the teacher's assessment will be taken into account for the issuing of the certificate.
- An 80% attendance rate is required to obtain a course certificate.

COURSE PROGRAMME

LEVEL C2

(INTENSIVE)

The C2 course has a minimum duration of 180 hours of teaching and learning. It consists of 16 teaching units, which are organized according to linguistic objectives and everyday topics. In these units, the five language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing and interaction) are developed in a balanced way. Sociocultural and pragmatic contents, learning strategies and self-assessment are also included. The programme is combined with the various special courses and activities run by the school, according to the needs and interests of the students.

OBJECTIVES

The students, at the end of the C2 course, is expected to:

- Have linguistic and non-linguistic resources to cope with all kinds of situations, including unforeseen and difficult ones.
- Use correct, appropriate, coherent and cohesive speech, whether in the familiar, neutral, formal or ceremonial register.
- Express themselves with accuracy, appropriateness, and fluency and have the ability to convey nuances of meaning.
- Know and use a wide range of idiomatic expressions and vocabulary, in different registers.
- Understand the implications of legal, contractual, administrative, medical and other specific texts.
- Be aware of the sociolinguistic and sociocultural implications of native speakers' use of the language, and know how to react accordingly.
- Be able to mediate effectively between Spanish speakers and people from their own community, taking into account sociocultural and sociolinguistic differences.
- Understand and be able to identify, in broad terms, the elements of standard speech in different linguistic varieties of the Spanish-speaking world.
- Learn about many aspects of Spanish and Latin American culture.

GENERAL CONTENTS

The students, during the C2 course, will learn and practice the basic notions of how to use the language for:

- Introducing themselves and discussing tastes and interests.
- Writing advertising documents for the public.
- Writing specialized or subject-specific documents.
- Producing visual and audio documents on topics of general or specific interest.
- Reacting to a work of art, appreciating its characteristics, and learning to write reviews.
- Advising and advising against something, with or without emphasis.
- Clarifying an opinion.
- Narrating own and others' (real or fictitious) anecdotes. Giving details, describing and evaluating.
- Describing a social situation. Explaining the causes of a social phenomenon.
- Expressing how to perform an action and specifying skills.
- Arguing, countering and explaining one's own opinion. Expressing agreement and strong disagreement.
- Expressing surprise, astonishment, and desire.
- Expressing politeness.
- Confirming a piece of information.
- Analysing and commenting on a narrative text.
- Comparing literal and figurative language.
- Expressing scepticism. Expressing certainty or lack of certainty, possibility, and lack of knowledge.
- Understanding and commenting on statistics. Supporting argument with statistical data. Refuting using statistical data.
- Arguing about ways of life.
- Describing in detail physical and character traits.

- Using colloquial vocabulary, sayings and proverbs, institutionalized utterances and idioms, typical of Spanish-speaking culture, especially Spain.
- Clarifying and specifying scientific and technical terms. Describing and valuing scientific and technical innovations and discoveries.
- Communicating effectively through different social networks.
- Narrating historical events in a colloquial way.
- Responding to formal enquiries.
- Expressing commitment.
- Explaining the origin of words.
- Formulating hypotheses about words.
- Emphasizing and highlighting information.
- Giving a lecture.
- Using politeness and persuasive strategies to make requests.
- Responding affirmatively to a request. Refusing to do somebody a favour or to meet a request.
- Arguing about current affairs. Debating and presenting arguments.
- Describing and comparing actions and situations in a process.
- Talking about the beginning and end of actions and events.
- Narrating a process of change.
- Establishing temporal relations between events.
- Expressing regret, complaint, reproach, etc. about a past situation.
- Expressing cause and consequence.
- Presenting alternatives to past events.
- Expressing punctuality and anticipation.
- Expressing continuation, repetition, duration, and frequency.
- Exploring and practising speech attenuation and repair strategies.
- Knowing the different strategies used in the Hispanic world.
- Expanding the lexical repertoire.

- Developing linguistic and metalinguistic comprehension strategies for watching films in Spanish, attending plays or enjoying other everyday experiences that require a high degree of analysis.

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS
